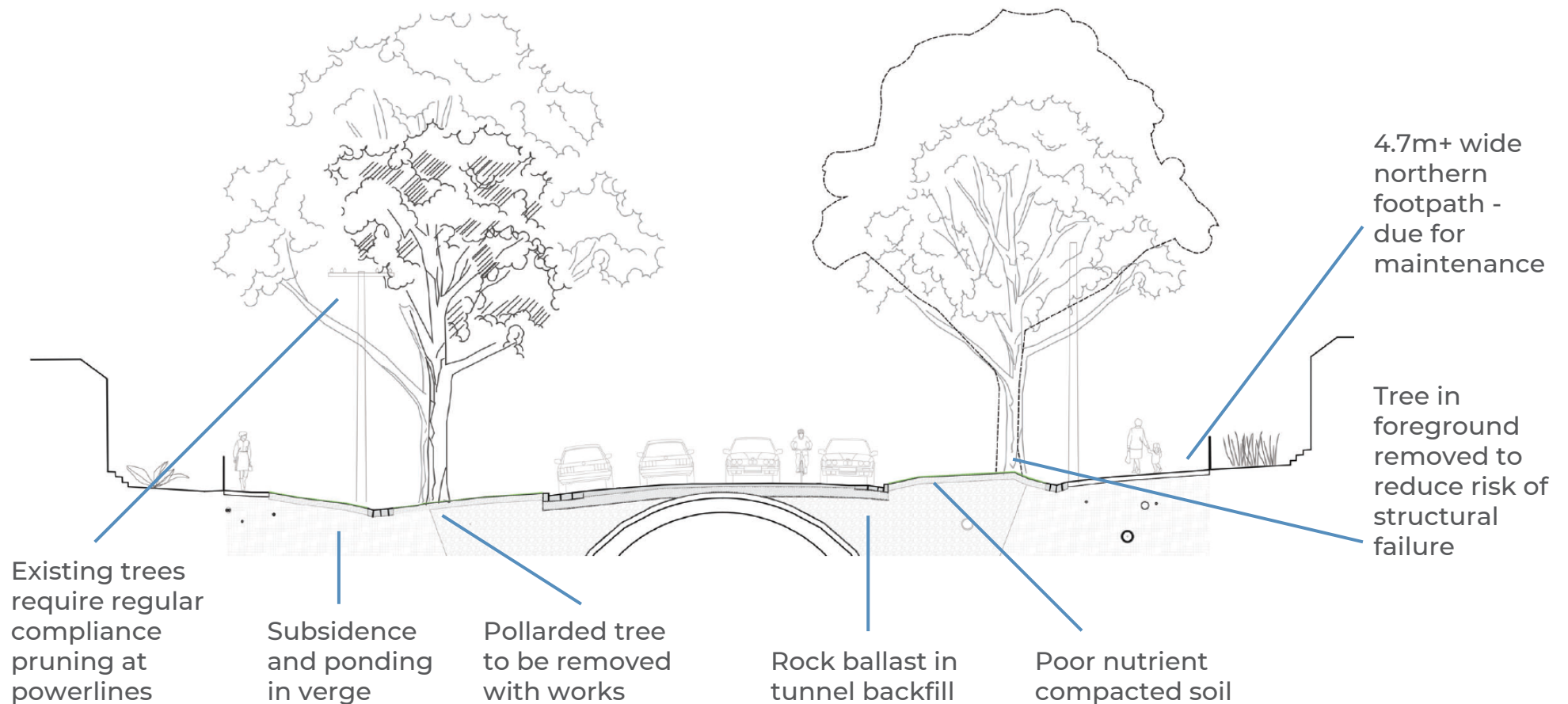

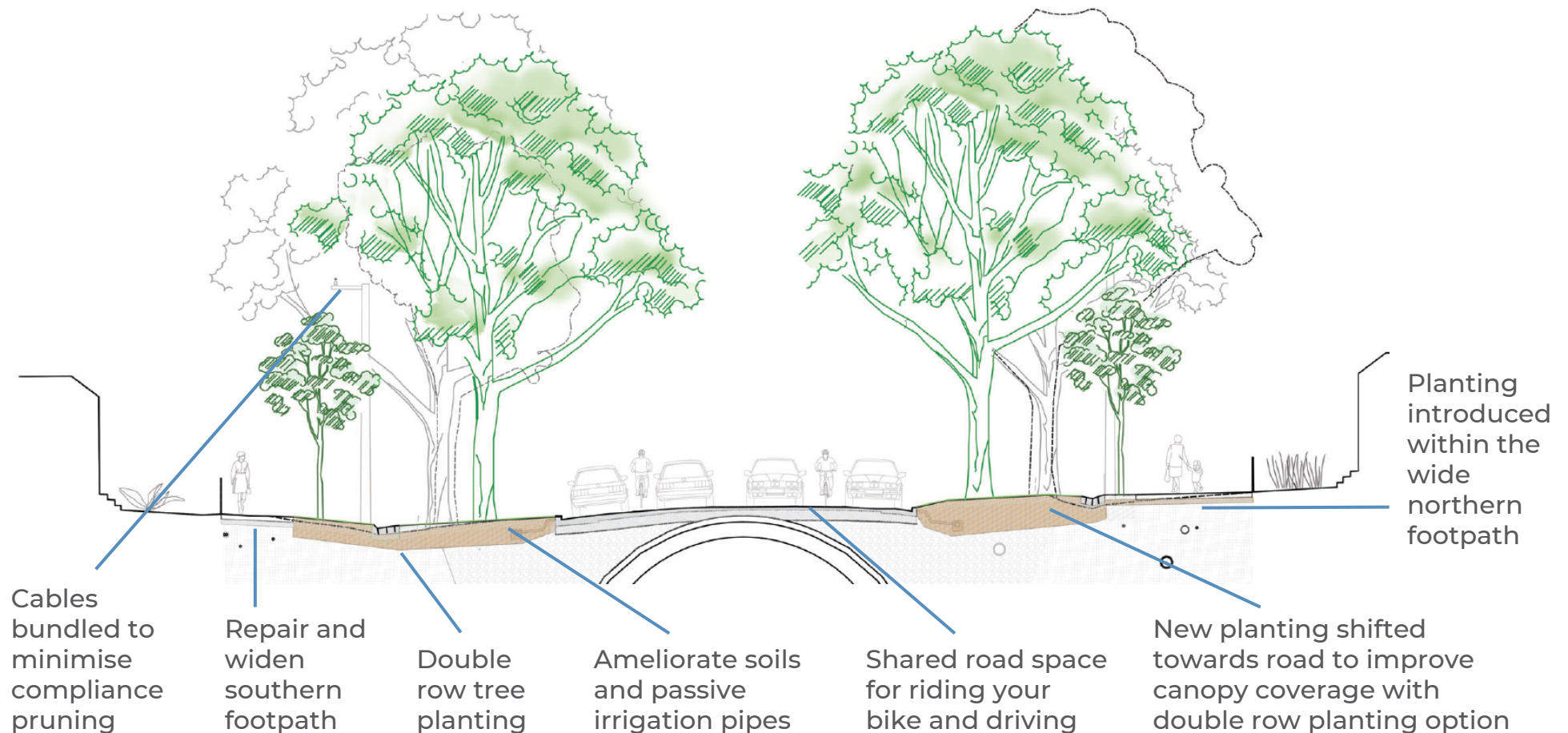

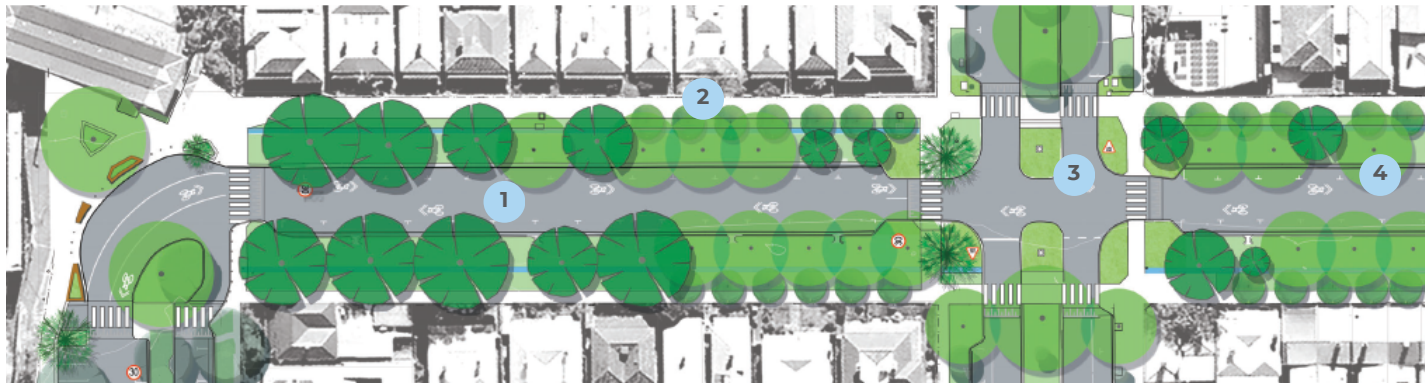

- 1 Advocate for reduction in traffic speed to 30km/h
- 2 Planting within the wide northern footpath
- 3 New kerb outstands with enhanced planting
- 4 Maintaining on street parking adjacent to residential entrances
- 5 Maximising canopy coverage of planting
- 6 Improving pedestrian amenity at crossings
- 7 Continuation of wide footpath and verge with shift to parallel parking
- 8 Widening the southern footpath

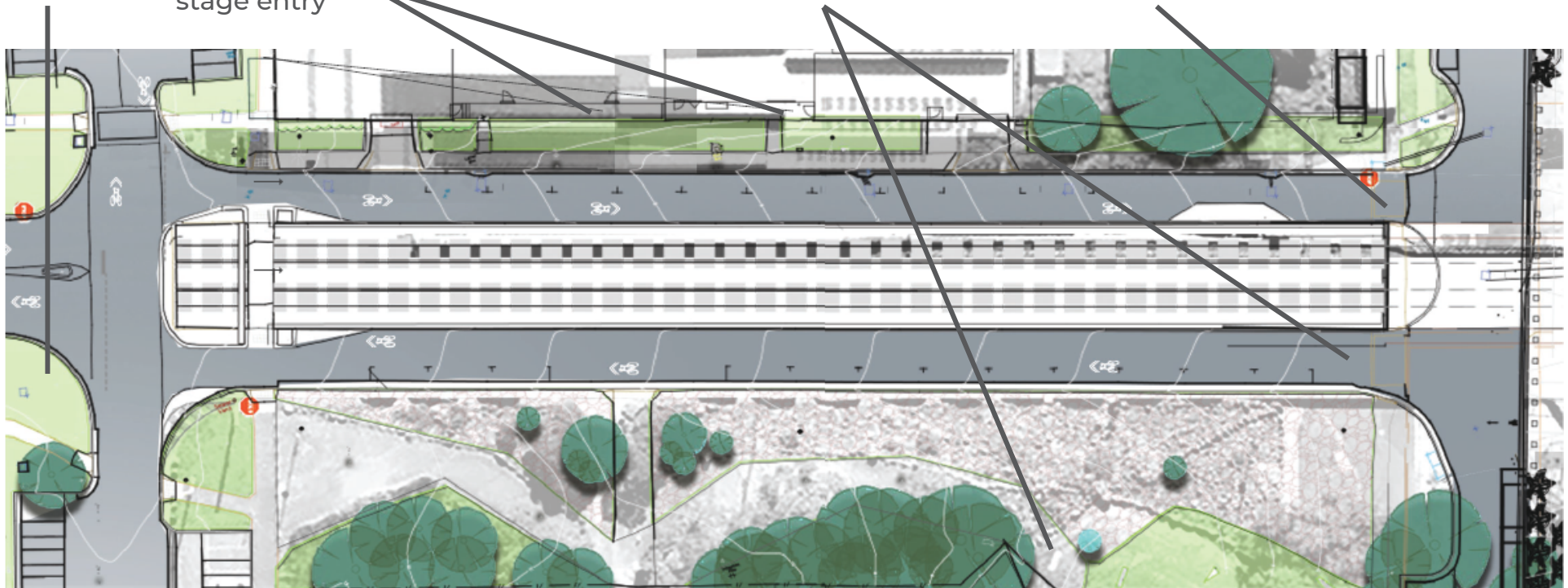
### Existing condition : Moreland to Maribyrnong Street connection

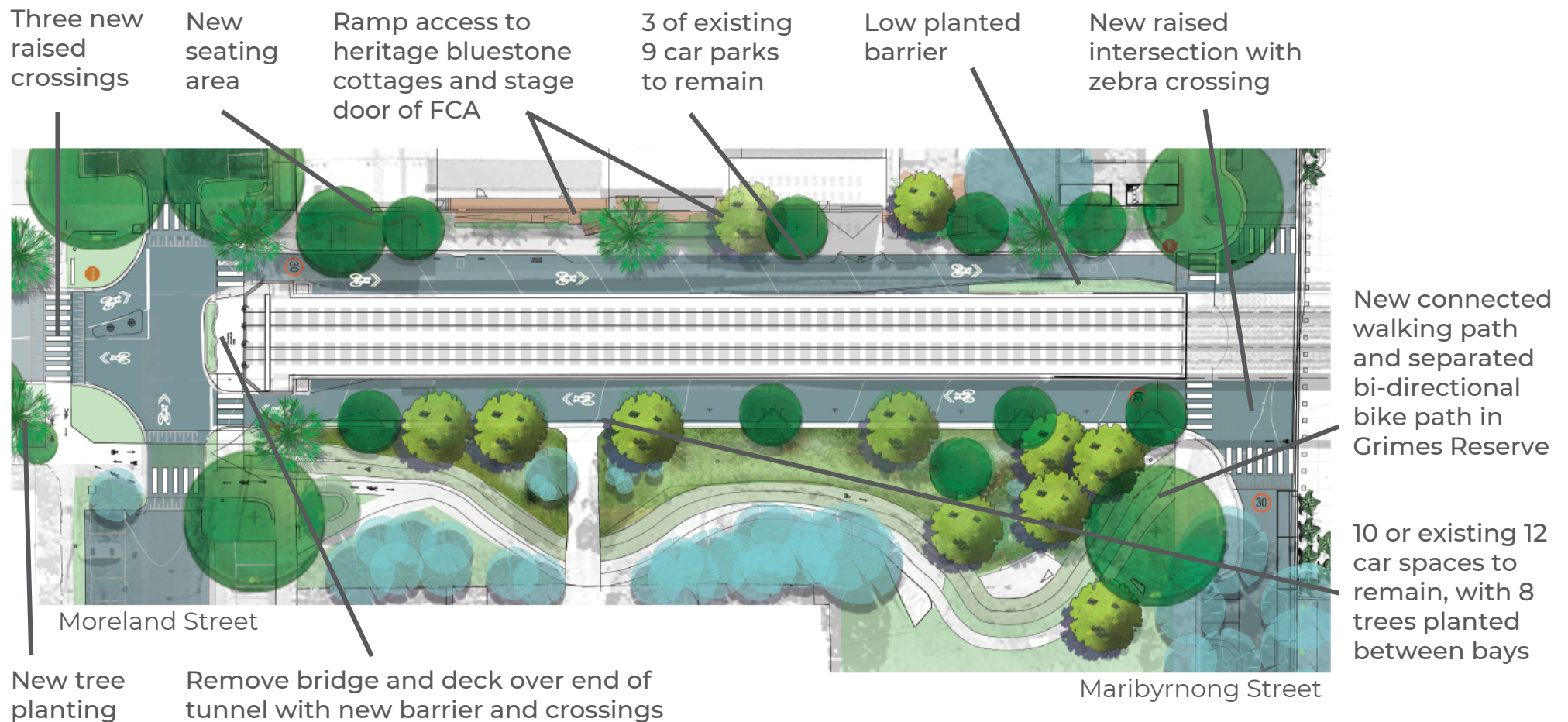

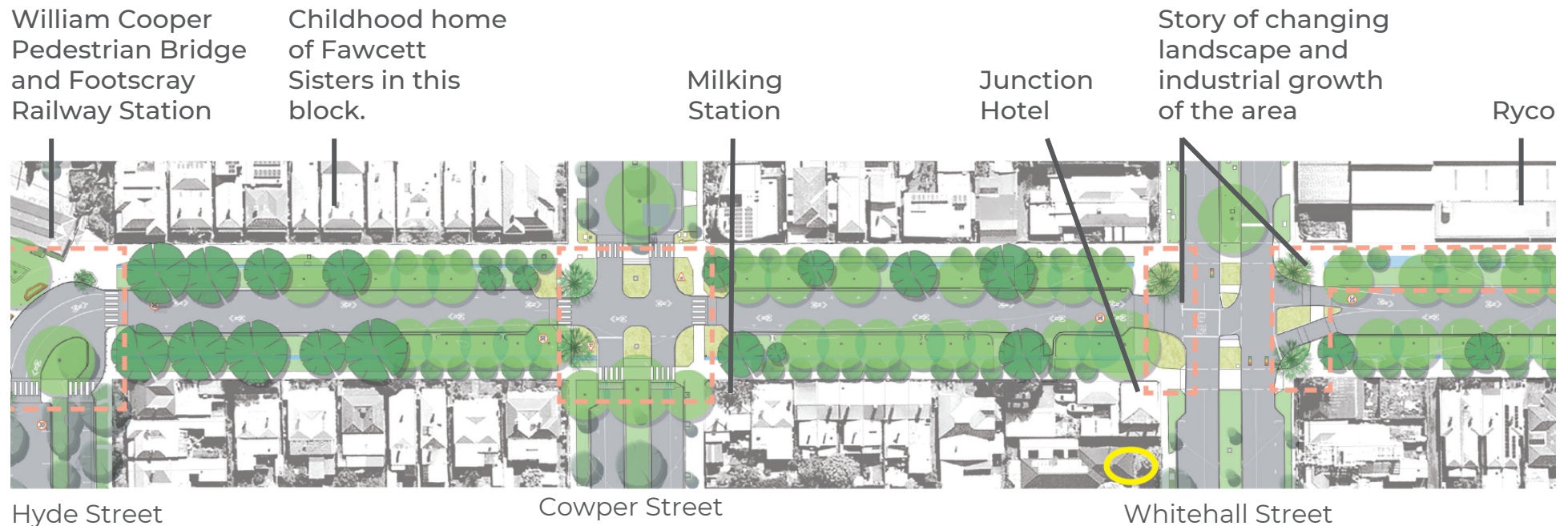

### Heritage opportunities

Bunbury Street has a rich heritage. Originally a bank on the edge of a saltwater river, home to native flora, fauna and indigenous people, this location became an important connection to the west with the landing of the punt at the shore. It grew into a key avenue of Footscray connecting the punt to the new rail station and later the rail line cut through this same avenue. Today it connects the urban realm of Footscray to one of the premier open spaces in Maribyrnong.
